Read Ecclesiastes 12:1

Read Ecclesiastes 12:2-8, inserting "Remember your Creator" from vs 1 at the beginning of verses 2-5.

- Had you read the allegory of the house as a description of the aging process before?
- Were the descriptions surprising?
- Is the aging process meaningless?

Because of Jesus, we do not fear death. Read John 11:25.

Think about the time that you have left, using the jar of marbles as an analogy.

- Do not feed your regrets, but make the most of your remaining days
- What are we to do with our remaining days, whether many or few?

Read Psalm 39:4-5, Psalm 71:18 & Matthew 28:18-20

Read Ecclesiastes 12:9-12

Read Ecclesiastes 12:13-14, Micah 6:8 & 2 John 6
